State of Virginia, Pendleton County (to wit)

On this 9th Day of November 1832 Personally appeared
~~in open~~ before

the Court of Pendleton, now sitting, Michael Hoover a
Resident of the South fork, a branch of the Potomac,
in the County of Pendleton & State of Virginia, aged
Twenty-nine years. Who being first duly sworn according
to Law, Doth, on his oath make the following Declaration
in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed
June 7th 1832, That he entered the Service of the United
States under the following named officers and served
as herein stated, first tour of three months (Drafted,
and served under Capt. Robert Davis, Ensign,
Francis Evick, in an expedition against the Indians
on the west fork of the Monongalia River in the northwestern
part of Virginia - Second tour of three months (Drafted

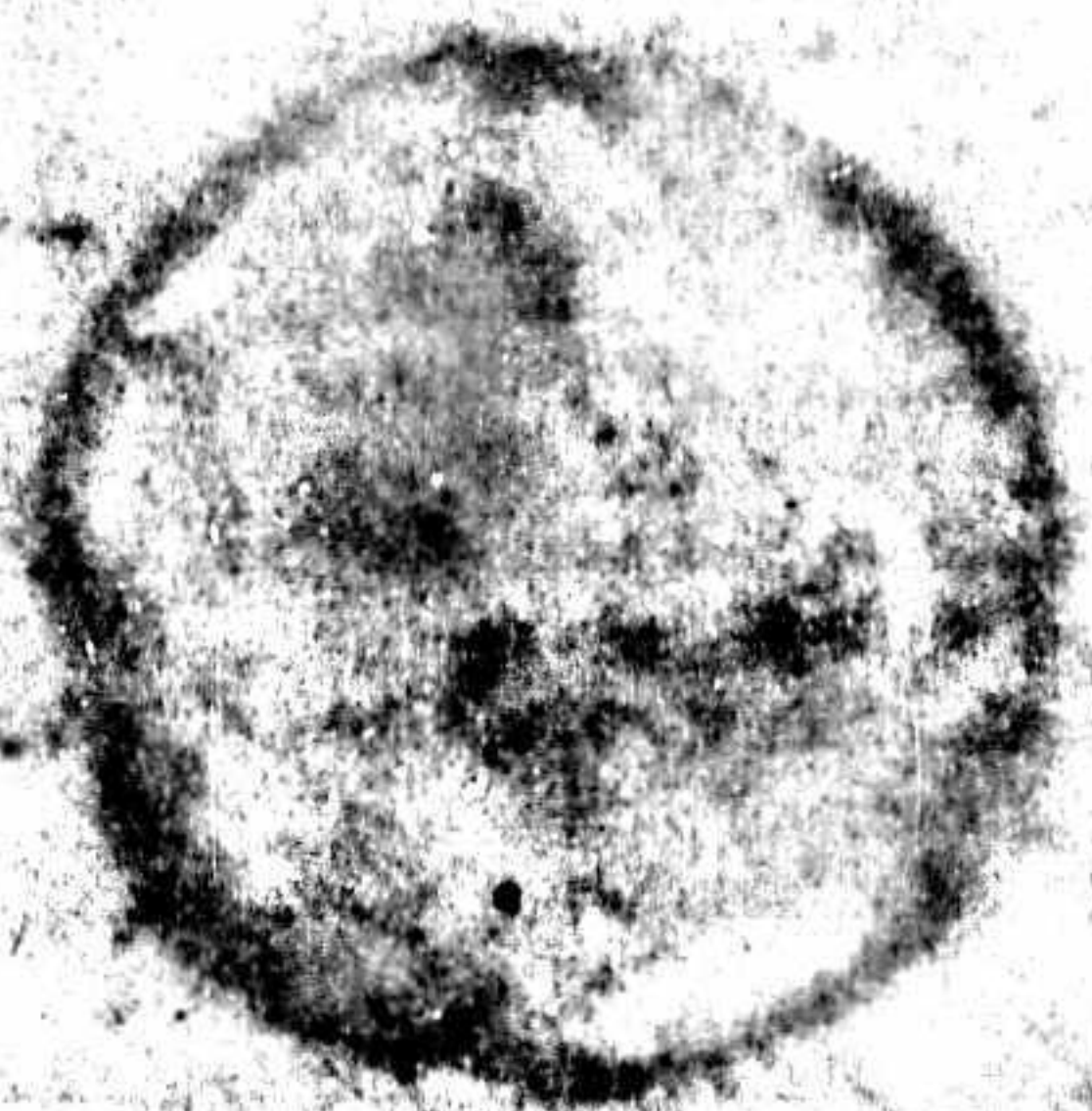
~~and marched to Richmond in Virginia~~
attached to another Company, the name of which
of which he does not now recollect - he thinks
he was Discharged some little time before the
Expiration of said three months - Third tour, called
& known by the name of twenty Days Draft, on this
Expedition he was ordered to furnish his own horse
and when the Company was under marching orders
and about to set out for Richmond, he was then
Detailed by Capt. Robert Davis to go in pursuit
of a gang of Tories in which service they were
engaged he thinks about three weeks; he says they
made a few Captives who were again set at
Liberty by their giving up their arms.

he says he was born on the South fork about twelve
miles from where he now lives, he says he has no
Documentary Evidence to offer in support of his claim

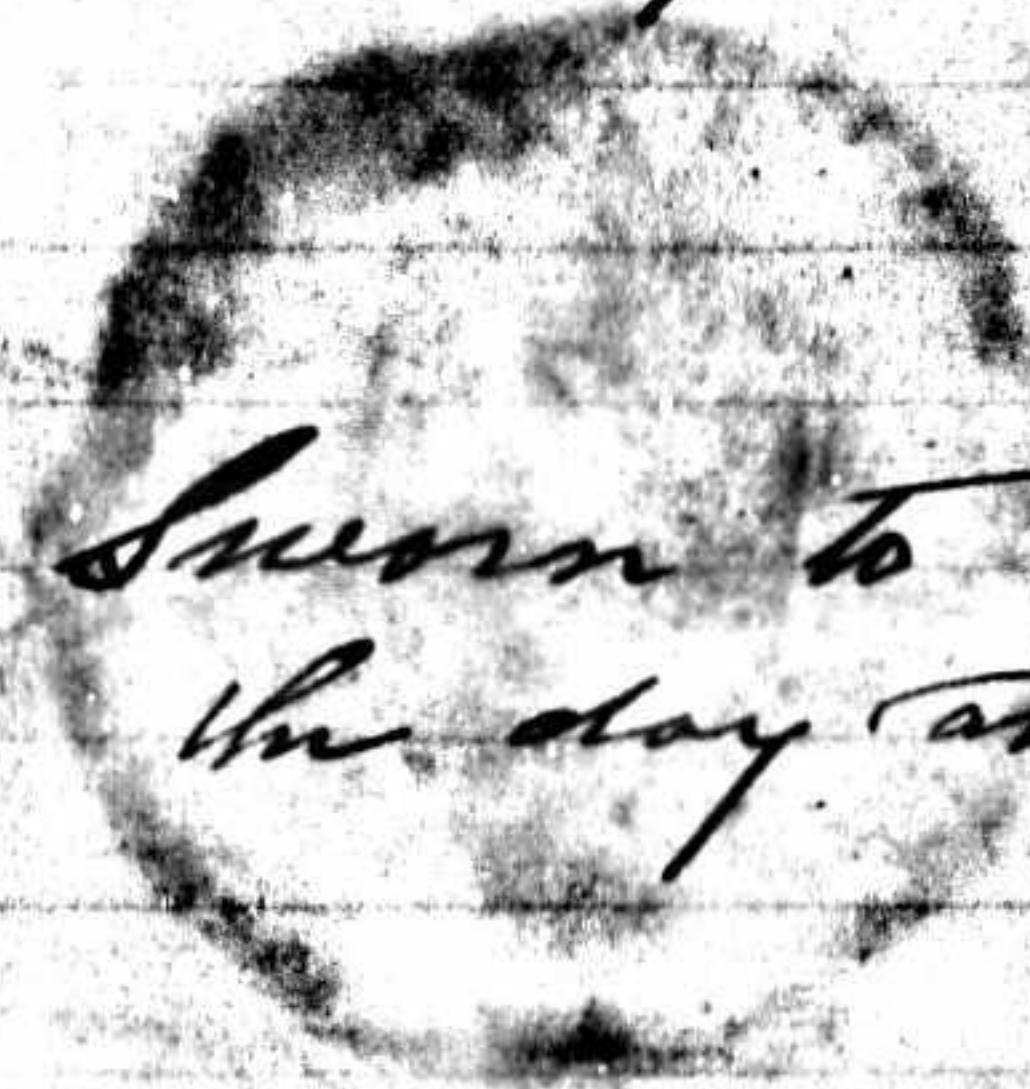

of the Monongohela & that Francis Enoch
was Lieutenant in said Company & that
at the time of said service, what is
now Pendleton County was of Augusta
County

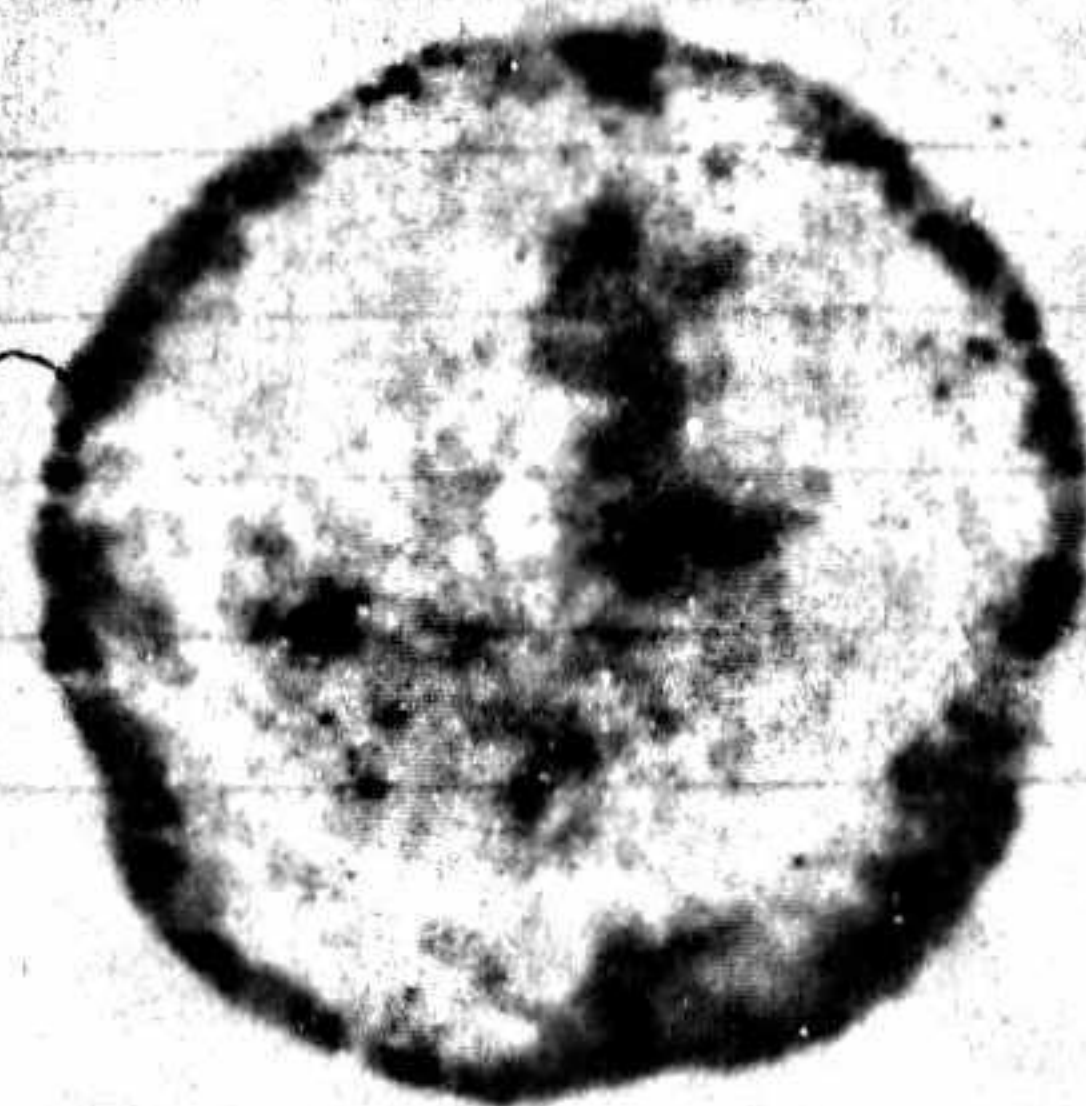

Dear Sir:

Reference is made to your letter in which you request information in regard to William Eagle and Michael Hoover, soldiers of the Revolutionary War, who were residing in Pendleton County, Virginia, in 1840. Their histories are furnished herewith.

The data given below are obtained from the papers on file in Revolutionary War pension claim, S.5560, based upon the military service of Michael Hoover in that war.

Michael Hoover was born on the south fork of the Potomac River in Virginia, date not given.

He enlisted, place not stated, and served three tours as a private in the Virginia Troops as follows: in 1778, three months in Captain Robert Davis' Company and went on an expedition against the Indians in the northwestern part of Virginia; on the second tour he served almost three months and went on an expedition to Richmond; ✓ dates and officers' names not given; on the third tour, he served ✓ three weeks in Captain Robert Davis' Company and went on an expedition against the Tories; no dates are given for this service.

Could not verify the capt

He was allowed pension on his application executed November 7, 1832, at which time he was aged seventy-nine years and resided on the south fork of the Potomac River in Pendleton County, Virginia, about twelve miles from the place of his birth.

There are no data as to his family.
